Welcome to Moraine Park Campground, set in a ponderosa pine forest above the meadows of Moraine Park. Please read this information to make the most of your stay and preserve and protect your national park.

Campsites

Checkout, Seasons, and Reservations • Checkout: 12 noon. Check in: 1 pm.

- Open all year.
- All sites are reservable late May–early Oct at www. recreation.gov or 877 444-6777. Reservations are highly recommended
- In winter, Loops B and E are first-come, first-served.
- Each campsite has a picnic table, fire grate, tent pad, and parking for one vehicle. More than one tent is allowed as long as all tents fit on the pad.
- Maximum RV/trailer length = 40 feet.
- A, B, C, and D Loop site are limited to 8 people.

Notes

- Maximum length of stay is 7 nights total parkwide between June 1 - September 30.
- Please be considerate of your fellow campers. Quiet hours are 10 pm–6 am. Generators may be run only between 7:30–10 am and 4–8:30 pm. Generators are not allowed in D Loop.
- Respect the area: no trenching or nails in trees.
- Ranger-led evening programs may be offered in summer.

Campfires

Jampines

Fires are only allowed in metal fire grates. Never leave fires or coals unattended. Fires must be completely extinguished before leaving the campsite or going to bed. Gathering firewood and fire-starting materials is prohibited. Firewood, ice, kindling, lighter fluid, charcoal, soda, and ice cream may be purchased with cash at the campground firewood sales shed.

Food Storage Keep a Clean Camp!

Help protect wildlife, including black bears, by properly storing your food at all times. Improperly stored or unattended food items will result in a violation notice. "Food items" include food, drinks, toiletries, cosmetics, pet food and bowls, and odoriferous attractants.

Store all food items in food storage lockers (shown on campground maps). Food storage lockers (see left) are shared with other visitors and cannot be locked. If full, store food items inside vehicle trunks. In vehicles without trunks, place items as low as possible in the passenger compartment and cover them from sight. Always close windows and lock doors. Visitors with convertibles or motorcycles should use food storage lockers.

- Never leave food items unsecured or unattended, day or night.
- Do not keep food or toiletries in tents.
- Garbage, including empty cans and food wrappers, must be stored or disposed of in trash or recycling containers.
- Hummingbird and bird feeders are not allowed in campgrounds—they attract raccoons, elk, deer, bears, and other animals.
- Coolers, dirty stoves, grills, non-disposable tableware and cookware must be washed and stored just like food (do not place hot grills in food storage lockers). Camp kitchens must be kept clean and individual items properly stored.

More Info

Sanitation

Comfort stations have sinks for washing dishes and disposing of waste/gray water. A, C, and D Loops have flush toilets in summer. B and E Loops have vault toilets all year. There is a dump station in summer. There are no laundry facilities in the park. Showers are available in nearby communities. Solar showers aren't allowed except at the campground's two solar shower facilities.

Vehicles and Bicycles

The campground speed limit is 15 mph. Keep all wheels on paved areas.

Pets

Pets must be on leashes no longer than six feet. Please clean up after them. PETS ARE PROHIB-ITED ON ALL ROCKY MOUNTAIN NATIONAL PARK TRAILS, TUNDRA, AND MEADOW AREAS. Store pet food in vehicle when not in use. Pets may not make noise that impacts visitors or wildlife.

Phones, Wifi

Cell service is unavailable in much of the park. Don't depend on a cell phone for emergency help. There is free wifi at Beaver Meadows, Fall River, and Kawuneeche visitor centers.

Fireworks, Firearms

The use of fireworks is prohibited in the park. Check with the park about current firearms regulations, 970 586-1206.

Emergencies

Call 911. Tell the dispatcher you are in Rocky Mountain National Park, Colorado.
